Seminar to be held on rural citizenship

The challenges facing rural communities, new local authority structures, and the centralised nature of Irish policy, were some of the themes discussed at a recent seminar at the Longford Women's Link.

The seminar, organised by Longford Women's Manifesto Group in association with Irish Rural Link provided an opportunity for the voluntary, community and statutory sectors to reflect on the im-

pacts of the reforms in local government, par-ticularly in terms of citi-

local government, particularly in terms of citzenship engagement.

The seminar heard from speakers who are actively involved in the new structures, coming from the perspectives of being volunteers and workers within county councils and community organisations.

There was much discussion on PPNs, the Public Participation Networks, which are the main link through which local authorities now connect with the community, voluntary and environmental sectors.

Sara Bourke, Policy Officer with Social Justice Ireland who works closely with PPNs gave an overview of how the new structures are working around the country, emphasising that they are still 'under construction'.
